I hope you and your family enjoyed the holidays and vacation time together! As we ring in the new year, it's a great time to look at some of the upcoming 4-H events that our members can all participate in this winter and spring: Presentation Day and Livestock Judging in February and Fashion Revue in April. Flyers about Livestock Judging and Fashion Revue are included at the end of the newsletter, and I'd like to focus on Presentation Day with you now. As you all know, I'm not a great public speaker! But thanks to my father encouraging me to participate in speech contests and classes from a young age, I'm not (usually) paralyzed by the idea of getting in front of a group of people. To me, that is the key benefit of Presentation Day- introducing kids to public speaking and communicating in groups so that they are comfortable with the concept. Understanding that communication is key to becoming a leader is heavily promoted in 4-H, but I feel it's also just as important how the ability to communicate is a key to becoming yourself. To be able to express and articulate ideas, thoughts and opinions is how we share with the world who we are. Having that ability, that confidence, to stand up in front of others and share with them what is important to you is a skill that you can use in many situations throughout your life.

It is a skill that gets a lot harder to hone if don't start when you are younger. I still remember my communications class in college, a mandatory public speaking class to graduate. Some students were not only nervous about it, they were terrified. Several dropped out, one girl left the room in tears mid-speech and never returned, and many stumbled through their speeches visibly shaken and upset the entire time. If we can introduce our kids to speaking in public at an early age, and in a supportive environment where they will be praised for their efforts and given constructive feedback, we can set them up for success.

Presentation Day starts at the county level on February 1st at the YAL Center in Rohnert Park. 4-H'ers who receive a gold for their presentation can then advance to the sectional Presentation Day (in the Bay Area). And 4-H'ers who earn a gold at sectional advance to the State Presentation Day (in spring during the 4-H Field Day at UC Davis). Presentation categories are open to all age groups and kids may choose from a variety of presentation styles, which include: demonstration, illustrated talk, science or engineering presentation, informative prepared speech, persuasive prepared speech, impromptu speech, interpretive reading, educational display, share-the-fun and cultural arts.

Participating in Presentation Day also ensures that 4-H'ers can start earning 4-H prepared speech credits if they are working toward stars in their record book keeping. While it may seem daunting to start; begin by visiting this link: http://cesonoma.ucanr.edu/4H/Events/Presentation_Day/. All of the information you need is on the page, plus links to the Presentation Day Manual, which explains the categories in depth, shares judging rubrics and offers tips and guidance to the 4-H'ers as they write and rehearse their speeches.

Applications for County Presentation Day must be submitted by mail to KC Canzoneri and postmarked by **January 15, 2020.** Scanned email entries will be accepted **until 11:59pm January 15th, 2020.** Send emails to kccanzoneri21@gmail.com. You can also use that email to ask KC any questions you might have. If your 4-H'er decides to do Presentation Day this year, please let me know. We have some club members who have participated before that can help with questions or even practice speeches together. Feel free to ask me any questions as well! 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
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
Activity Corner 4-H Cryptogram


The key above the cryptogram lists all of the letters A-Z; each of the letters has a corresponding number.


Each of the blank boxes has a number underneath it; fill in the letters that correspond to the numbers to solve the phrases. The Answer Key is located on the next


